



Getty Images Gallery

The Photographer's Gallery

Founded in London in 1971, it was the first independent gallery in Britain that was devoted entirely to photography. It also hosts a café and bookshop.

The Wallace Collection

An art collection in London open to the public, housed at Hertford House in Manchester Square; it comprises a world-famous range of fine and decorative arts from the 15th to the 19th centuries with large holdings of French 18th-century paintings, furniture, arms & armour, porcelain and Old Master paintings arranged into 25 galleries.

St George's Hanover Square

Tucked away just off Regent Street, the church of St George's Hanover Square is an unusual looking building with an imposing portico that overlooks Hanover Square. In contrast to the grey exterior, the inside of the church is light and open. St George's is most well known for one of its famous parishioners, composer George Frideric Handel. Handel even provided advice on the impressive organ that is still housed in St George's. The church regularly hosts music performances, including concerts for the London Handel Festival.

Eating and Shopping...



St Christopher's Place

For plenty of places to eat cuisine from all over the world, look out for the landmark purple clock as you walk along Oxford Street and you'll suddenly discover the entrance to St Christopher's Place – home to an eclectic mix of shops, boutiques, restaurants and bars.

Oxford Street, Regents Street & Bond Street

For all of your shopping needs, head to any of these three main streets. Oxford Street runs east to west and has many large department stores; Regents Street goes from north to south, ending at famous Piccadilly Circus and around the corner from Trafalgar Square; Bond Street also runs north to south and is home to some of the most prestigious shops in London.

Soho

To the south of Oxford Street and east of Regents Street, the area is known as Soho. Once an area of many scandals, it is now full of restaurants, bars and shops. Look out for **Carnaby Street**, a pedestrianised shopping street which is home to fashion and lifestyle retailers, including a large number of independent fashion boutiques.

Hyde Park & Green Park

One of the largest parks in London and one of its Royal Parks. The park is the largest of four that form a chain from the entrance of Kensington Palace through Kensington Gardens and Hyde Park, via Hyde Park Corner and Green Park past the main entrance to Buckingham Palace and on through Saint James's Park to Horse Guards Parade in Whitehall.

Regents Park

The 166 hectares (410 acres) park is mainly open parkland with a wide range of facilities and amenities, including gardens; a lake with a heronry, waterfowl and a boating area; sports pitches; and children's playgrounds. The northern side of the park is the home of London Zoo. Marylebone Rd,
